RESOLUTION INTRODUCED BY COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE TO SUPPORT RETAINING JOBS AT FRONTIER INSURANCE COMPANY DURING THE COURT ORDERED REHABILITATION PLAN PROCEEDINGS

WHEREAS, the New York State Liquidation Bureau (NYLB) acting as receiver for the Superintendant of the New York State Department of Financial Services is in the process of liquidating Frontier Insurance Company as part of a court ordered rehabilitation plan proceeding, and

WHEREAS, as part of the rehabilitation plan proceeding the NYLB has the responsibility to administer the remaining insurance policies and has the ability to determine the physical location where the remaining "run-off" business will be performed, and

WHEREAS, Frontier Insurance Company employees approximately 50 people at their Rock Hill, New York offices, processing the "run-off" business, and

WHEREAS, the loss of these 50 jobs will have a detrimental impact on the lives of the employees and on the economy of Sullivan County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sullivan County Legislature hereby requests that the NYLB allow the remaining "run-off" business to continue to be performed in Rock Hill, New York, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Clerk to the Legislature shall transmit an electronic copy of this resolution to Governor Andrew M. Cuomo, Senator John Bonacic, Assemblywoman Aileen Gunther, and Benjamin M. Lawsky, Superintendent of the New York State Department of Financial Services.

Center for Workforce Development Highlights

- 1. NYS Dept of Labor is in receipt of a National Emergency Grant (NEG) that will make available \$^ million statewide for On-the-Job Training (OJT) contracts with business. An OJT is designed to be a "win-win" for the employer and the employee. Through this grant, businesses hiring eligible job seekers will qualify for wage reimbursements for up to six months. This grant is focused on the hiring of long term unemployed people. The Workforce Development Business Services Team is meeting August 3rd to put an action plan in place to inform businesses and job seekers of this new opportunity.
- 2. Jonathan Freitis from TD Bank North will be meeting with youth participants in the Summer Youth Employment Program to talk about the basics of banking and saving money. These sessions will be held in early August to coincide with the first payroll period.
- 3. Attended an education meeting hosted by SCCC on July 12. Focus is on better alignment of education and economic development.
- 4. Led a presentation on NY workforce system services for USDOL Region 1 representatives from 9 Northeastern States on July 19.
- 5. Work continues on the Workforce Investment Act local plan for Program Year 2012. The plan is due to NYS Department of Labor by September 14, 2012.
- 6. For the 2nd quarter of 2012 Welfare to Work program:

235 individuals completed the required orientation 134 TANF (57%) 91 Safety Net (39%)

Of those who completed orientation:

114 (49%) were new applicants to the Sullivan County welfare system. 88 from Sullivan County (77%) 16 from another county within NYS (14%) 10 from another state (9%)

7. The Program Year 2011 (July 1, 2011 – June 30,2012) the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) Adult, Dislocated Worker and Youth programs served a total of 3,533 individuals. Of those served:

2,616 received core job search services

1,514 received intensive services

347 received education and training services

142 received short term pre-vocational training services

24 received youth services

Looking at unemployment rate data back to 1974 there has not been another time when the unemployment rate for June in Sullivan County was 9.8. The closest rates for June are recent years: 2011 (8.7%), 2010 (8.5%) and 2009 (8.5%). Prior to that there were 1992 and 1977 both at 8.1%.

The June 2012 data from the NYS Dept of Labor shows that the Sullivan County Resident Civilian Labor Force (35,300) increased by from June 2011 to June 2012. However, within that number the number of employed dropped by 300 while the number of unemployed increased by 400. The unemployed number includes those that are in receipt of unemployment insurance benefits as well as those who state they are actively looking for work. In reaching out to the NYSDOL Division of Research and Statistics, they stated that statewide the rates for June have been the highest since 1990. This is attributed to an increase in claims as well as an increase of people reentering the job search market.

US Department of Agriculture RMAP loans approved by the IDA during June and July:

- 1- Krankypants LLC, Patricia and Anthony Mentnech, in the amount of \$40,000, for a Laundromat project in Woodbourne.
- 2- Majeck Furniture Warehouse Inc, William Cuttita, in the amount of \$50,000, for a retail furniture store in Monticello.
- 3- ND Pro Media Inc, Matthew Dorcas, in the amount of \$25,000, for a film making service in Monticello.
- 4- Prohibition Distillery LLC, Brian Facquet and John Walsh, in the amount of \$50,000 for a craft distillery in Roscoe.
- 5- Samba Café and Inn LLC, Tim and Andrea Corcoran, in the amount of \$30,000 loan and \$4,500 grant for website design, for the processing and distribution of Brazilian cheese bread.

Millennium Loans approved by the Sullivan County Funding Corporation during June and July:

- 1- 49 Main Street LLC, Jon Westergreen, in the amount of \$21,000, for a specialty retail business featuring locally grown food in Livingston Manor.
- 2- 233 Hurd Parks Road LLC, Colleen Cunningham, in the amount of \$50,000, for the expansion of agri-business destination in Swan Lake.

On July 18, 2012, the IDA approved the Loughlin & Billig PC project. This project will allow local attorneys to keep their operations within Sullivan County and will eventually add 10 new employees. Renovations of the vacant building at 461 Broadway will cost between \$225,000 and \$300,000.

Project Deep Freeze	High	O hio based frozen food company is seeking 10,000 sq ft for storage and distribution. BA has submitted a 13,000 sq. ft building in Bloomingburg that formerly housed the WE Ship Express company. The search is in its early stages.
Project Exact	High	Illinois firm is seeking 60 to 100,000sq ft to expand a plastic injection molding company eastward. BA has submitted the Quickway metal fabrication company as it is the closest suitable alternative.
Project Olive	High	An olive oil producer from Spain is seeking a US partner to distribute its finished and bottled products here. BA has contacted WE Ship Express a previous SCP project which was located on McDonald Road in Wurtsboro who has expressed interest. The Spanish company is currently sending samples to BA to begin determining quantity, cost, end users and other logistics. We Ship Express will respond with proposal. The potential for yet another expansion exists at the distribution headquarters in Wurtsboro which would add mores jobs to the area. This was a WEDA generated lead. UPDATE: Samples ariived to BA yesterday. A meeting with WE Ship Express is sxcheduled for next week to map out terms and logistics.
Project Recycling	Med	A recycling company has expressed interest in an existing 100,000 sq ft. facility somewhere along the Route 17 Corridor between Binghampton and NYC. No facility exists meeting the size requirment in Sullivan County. However, BA has submitted the Quickway Metals building which is 80,000sq ft. The company representative has visited an inspected the facility though still small for the overall needs of the company. They contiue to search in Delawsre and Orange County. UPDATE: Putting together short loist of sites. Sullivan site a long shot.
Project Back Office	High	Manhattan based company seeking back office customer service space. Company will be looking at two locations and may possibly consider new construction at Emerald Corporate Center. 20,000sq.ft, 100 jobs with 401k and benefits. Update : Company visited with BA on Sat. 4/21/12 and is interested in space at Frontier Insurance. BA has provided comparative cost analysis and additional critical information needed for company to make a final decision. We are competing with Orange County, New Jersey, Texas, and northwest states. Update III : we have made the short list for final selection. Company is concerned with quantity and quality of employees. BA is working with Workforce Development to resolve this question. Update III : Company representative met with BA and Laura Quigley, who provided the company with sample job descriptions and reviewed the various Workforce Development offerings. The meeting was very positive as the details of jobs, work place responsibilities, recruitment, were all discussed. The companywil re-engage after the July 4th break. Job numbers have gone up to 130. Environmental Benefit - an adaptive reuse of an existing facility. UPDATE: Company has reviewed other sites will respond over the next several weeks. Note: COmpany has been advertising locally as a test for employee suitability.
ASB Greenworld	Med	Fully under construction at this time and is training employees and completing working relationships with local suppliers. Update: Company ran into an issue getting high speed internet to the site. SCP has facilitated discussions with Verizon and TW to provide that service. <u>Update II:</u> Company has found a remedy. Company expects to bee operational and begin deliveries in July.
Project Aquaculture	Med	An out of state group is seeking to locate a large aquaculture facility in Sullivan County. The company will hire 200 employees and seeks to construct a 500,000 sq. ft facility. BA has submitted suitable sites for consideration. The group is well financed and will be developing similar facilities in Canada. Update: The company representaive has informed BA that its is interested in the Liberty Commerce Park, a site for which the Partnership secured \$100,000 in "Build Now New York" grants in 2007. The site developers have competed its environmental review and has secured approval for the 1st phase of the development. Update: Il BA has met with the company representatives which continue to express interest in Liberty. We are however, now competing with Montgomery County which does have a shovel ready business park in the Town of Florida. BA is preparing a comparaztive analysis and an incentive projection for the prospect. Update: Il Company is finalizing financing and will make a site decision upon completion.

- SCVA'S 2012 Visitors Guide is being distributed to visitors centers, web and 800 requests and ad placement requests.
- SCVA is exploring new programs for the promotion of Sullivan County for Fall. Through this endeavor SCVA attended a NYS sponsored Media Marketplace in NYC. There, SCVA met with numerous writers. Many of those writers have already expressed interest in covering the Big Eddy Film Festival, Harvest Festival at Bethel Woods, our great outdoors, farm to fork, foliage, The Sullivan opening, Fall Food Events at the Villa Roma and the Catskill Distillery.
- Pig Mountain 2012 returns to the Catskills on August 11, being held in Narrowsburg this year. The organizers have taken over this event locally and plan to entice people to make a weekend around the event.
- SCVA is working with a Westchester group to explore a pilot program involving our Sullivan County Ag community supplying agricultural product to major food service operations in Westchester.
- SCVA is working with several community minded advocates to create new ideas that will spawn county-wide events.
