March 2015 Monthly Report

Adult Care Center:

Facility:

- Received new dining room chairs for the 1st Floor Dining Room.
- A new stove was donated to the Rehabilitation Department by Family Council.

Marketing:

- Attended the ribbon-cutting for Youngsville Health Center.
- Marketing visits were made at medical offices in Monticello, Catskill Regional Medical Center Case Management Department and Monticello Senior Group.
- Held an exhibition table at the Government Center, where we offered free blood pressure screenings and promotional giveaways.
- We ran full-page color ad in the Democrat Health Edition, the Senior Living section of Catskill Shopper, the Health section of the River Reporter, Business and Professional Women's program and "Thank you to our EMS providers" in the Democrat EMS recognition supplement.

Community Services:

Ongoing Operations:

Our overall operations for March had an increase in productivity this month. The chemical dependency clinic was slightly lower than the same period last year by 40 and the outpatient mental health treatment clinic's visits provided were about the same as the same period last year (see statistics attached). The Department served 749 Sullivan County residents in March. As a reminder, the Chemical Dependency clinic is continuing to provide a more intensive ambulatory service based on significant increases in those people presenting with an opioid or heroin addiction. The Department was approved for the OMH Vital Access Provider (VAP), a one-time grant which will assist in improving productivity and clinical outcomes of our clinic services. We hope to purchase additional programs to our scheduling system to allow for robotic appointment reminder telephone calls, text messages and e-mails in hopes to reduce our no-show rates for scheduled appointments. Management and therapists have and will continue to formulate and implement new treatment activities in our clinics to meet the community needs. An example is the department rolled out a "Just In Time" scheduling in March of 2015. The care management unit continues to actively engage Health Home participants in the development and engagement of the health plans as well as enrolling those persons eligible in Care Management programs. The Department completed the Cultural Competency Training for staff.

Local Government Units Activities:

In March the department is still working with an increased effort to get the regionally developed NYS
Regional Delivery System Reform Incentive Payment programs (DSRIP) with three stages: planning,
development and implementation plans. The three entities proposing the development of patient
provider service networks are REFUAH, Montefiore and Westchester Medical Center. To date all three
have submitted applications and have been approved. There have been mergers of competing proposals
in other regions in the state.

- The local Drunk Driver Education Program is an educational program for people arrested for DWI. The
 program has continued to be provided in the Community Services Building and will reimburse the County
 for the space.
- The Department is still working with local providers to continue submitting funding applications to provide help to families whose children have been diagnosed with serious emotional disturbances. The Department is still working to add a family peer support worker with the Independent Living Center Inc.'s peer services to Sullivan County residents. The Department, ILC and Catskill Regional Medical Center have met to plan and implement the integration of this peer service into the hospital's ER and inpatient unit for improved aftercare. We are also seeking to add respite capacity to families through SullivanARC's services.

Other activities participated in:

- Held an in-house meeting regarding the VAP grant to prepare for the meeting with the State in March.
- Participated in the Montefiore & Westchester County Medical Center DSRIP Steering committee governance meetings.
- Met with Jeff Sklar, Director of Operations from Catholic Charities Community Services of Orange County who has taken over the operations of the Recovery Center in Monticello.
- Met with the behavioral health subcommittee to go over the Local Government Plan which is due to the state by June 1st.

Other regular activities performed: the meeting of the internal corporate compliance committee reviewing internal operations, Conference of Local Mental Hygiene Directors Executive and Directors meetings, Legislative committee & actions.

Family Services:

Contracts:

Basic Workload Volume in Major Program Areas —March 2015 this office began with 82 active DFS agreements (of all types) in place. The ending total of 81 active agreements includes 11 agreements of various formats required by state agencies. 9 with a range of providers (DOH required state model facilitated enrollment protocols with 3 providers, DOH required state model MOU for MA Outreach with 4 providers, DOH required MOU delineating LDSS, DDSO & DOH responsibilities in regard to adult protective services, DOH required state model provider referral agreements with 2 comprehensive Medicaid case management (CMCM) providers, and 2 with state agencies (OCFS for child protective service and child welfare services related funded portable information technology and OTDA for use of Imaging/Enterprise Document Repository (I/EDR)) The remaining agreements are for the provision of service across the areas of Child Care (3), Child Support (2), Domestic Violence/Family Violence related (1), Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP fka Food Stamps) related (2), institutional Foster Care (16), HEAP Related (3) Medicaid/Medical Assistance program related (12), Preventive services related (5), Non-Secure Detention (NSD) services related (1), Professional services (5), Welfare-to-Work related (3), and various interdepartmental agreements.

<u>Major Issues in the Department</u> -In March 2015 this office submitted one (1) resolution and correlating legislative resolution cover memorandum requesting authorization to enter into a DFS contract active for the CY 2015 county budget cycle. The office completed no cost trend reviews of foster care payments reports from fiscal unit resulting in initiation of no institutional foster care contract modifications.

<u>State Reports</u> –during the month March 2015 this office received four (4) state oversight reports: OCFS' 1/2015 CACHE Res DV report and three OCFS 1-3/2015 Quarterly HFNY reports; with the CACHE DV composite summary report updated and published to DFS shared access drives.

<u>Corporate Compliance Activities</u> -In March 2015 this office ran exclusions lists at System for Awards Management (SAM), the US Department of HHS OIG, and NYS OMIG and compared those against active DFS contractors and DFS staff names with the monthly results report published to DFS shared access drives.

Contract Monitoring -during the month March 2015 this office received, updated, compiled and published composite reports to DFS shared access drives for shared access: one (1) contractor self-report: CACHE 1/2015 Non-Residential DV Reports; two (2) in-house end user reports: CY 2013 & 2014 WTW E&T Costs Report For OGS; performed two (2) trend analyses of needs indicators: Preventive, CCW&CA services contract; and DSS & DA's Office Fraud, IPV & FIT MOU Process review with SIU Coordinator. Additionally, this office handled seventy eight (78) contract monitoring contacts, supporting documentation reviews and interactions required to process to fully executable status and evidence maintenance of compliance to contract file records.

Fraud Investigations

Special Investigations

As of 3/1/15 the Special Investigations Unit had 1,009 Active Investigations. During the month 248 total Fraud Referrals were received resulting in 159 investigations assigned to the Unit and 89 were dismissed. The Fraud Investigators completed 148 Investigations. As of 3/31/15 the end of the month total was 1,021 active investigations.

The unit received 118 referrals for Front End Detection and Eligibility Verification Review investigations. The unit closed 114 FEDS/EVR investigations resulting in a \$667,620 Monthly Cost Avoidance. The unit collected \$17,018 for Accident lien recovery, \$18,974 for Estate Recoveries, \$3,304 for Recoupments, and \$102,760 for Restitution, a total of \$142,056 in Resource and Collection Recovery. The Unit received 10 requests for indigent burials resulting in 4 burials being approved, \$8,360 total indigent burial costs.

Child Support Enforcement:

The Child Support Enforcement Unit Collections for the month of March 2015 are \$969,752. The total TANF collections are \$77,986 and the total DFS NON-TANF collections are \$19,081. The DFS total amount collected is \$97,067.

There were 23 petitions filed in the month of March 2015 and 2 Paternity Establishments (including acknowledgements). The total CSEU cases open as of March 2015 are 5556.

Services

Foster Care/Adoption

As of March, 2015 there are 84 children in foster care. 10 of the total number are in residential centers. 25 of the total number are freed for adoption. There is on-going activity to reduce the number of children in foster care through discharge to a parent or other appropriate resource, discharge to independent living or adult custodial care as well as adoption.

Child Protective Services

The CPS unit received 145 new reports alleging child abuse and/or maltreatment in March, 2015. 40
of these reports were assigned to the FVRT.

Preventive

 The preventive unit has 101 open cases at the end of March, 2015. During March there were 19 new referrals. The unit also has 80 active referrals that are receiving assessments and/or short term services.

Adult Services

• The adult services unit has 135 open PSA cases at the end of March, 2015. Of the 135, 74 are representative payee cases and10 guardianships. Personal care aide services are provided to 125 cases. There is 1 long term case and 47 PERS (personal emergency response) cases.

Department Updates

• The Services Department continues to work with the Bonadio Group to review Department processes and how to improve overall efficiency. This review is expected to continue over the next few months. Additionally, the Department is preparing for a federal review of Title IV-E cases later this year.

Temporary Assistance (TA)

Temporary Assistance (TA) Monthly Report:

As of 3/31/15, the breakdown of Temporary Assistance active cases was as follows:

- 355 PA TANF cases (Public Assistance, Temporary Aid to Needy families)
- 275 PA SN cases (Public Assistance, Safety Net)
- 5779 NPA FS (Non-Public Assistance, Food Stamps)
- 3139 HEAP applications processed serving 7967 individuals

Medical Assistance (MA) Monthly Report:

As of 3/31/15, the breakdown of Medical Assistance active cases was as follows:

- 6897 MA cases (Medical Assistance)
- 2664 MA/ SSI cases (Medical Assistance/ Supplemental Security Income)

Department Goals:

- Completed a Web-based training on Processing Expedited SNAP benefits. 38 employees from the SNAP, TA, and MA units attended over a one-week period.
- Hosted OTDA trainers to implement Phase 1 of the training on MyWorkspace, the computer program
 used for processing HEAP and SNAP benefits. This 2 hour presentation was the first step in
 scheduling a series of trainings throughout the rest of the year. These trainings will focus on TA,
 SNAP, and HEAP programs.
- Continuing to implement the changes in program Intake and program Undercare units for SNAP and
- Implementing recommendations made by OTDA/Bonadio group for SNAP and TA program enhancements and improvements.
- Reviewing vendor applications and questionnaires for the Vendor Application process. Working with Housing Services Case Manager to identify new shelter vendors as part of the process.

Office for the Aging:

- EISEP Services (non-Medical/non-Medicaid homecare) 906 hours of homecare provided to 31 participants. These participants received a total of 153 hours of case management.
- Home Delivered Meals-4402 meals provided to 265 homebound participants.

- Congregate Meals-1144 meals provided to 149 participants.
- Medical Transportation-265 trips provided by RSVP/Sullivan County Transportation to doctor's offices and hospitals.
- Shopping bus-88 shopping trips provided.
- Emergency Medical Alerts provided to 42 individuals.
- HIICAP (Health insurance Information Counseling and Assistance Program)-50 individuals were assisted with health insurance/prescription issues.
- Sixty individuals were assessed for Office for the Aging Programs and other services they might be eligible for.

Public Health:

- The Account Clerk/Database position In Early Care was filled and our new employee started on March 16, 2015. She has been a welcomed addition to the El staff and is helping catch up on the significant back log of work that resulted from a lengthy Medicaid audit and staff shortages due to medical leaves.
- It is anticipated that now that EI is fully staffed, they will be able to complete the backlog of work and billing.
- Two nursing vacancies have been filled; one RN was promoted to CHN, leaving another RN vacancy that needs to be filled soon with the upcoming busy summer and training/orientation process required.
- Corporate Compliance annual recertification was completed.
- The Public Health Director has been involved with DSRIP activities and calls, Rural Health Network planning initiatives with community organizations including worksite wellness, Health emergency planning for an upcoming POD Drill in April, Prescription Drug Task Force, and finalized the Health Summit report for distribution.
- Our NYSDOH approved Opioid Overdose Prevention Training program is being organized by a newly hired
 per diem nurse to be up and running with our first training to be held in April. We plan to provide our law
 enforcement partners with additional trainings and replacement Narcan kits as needed.
- Next step is to update our data and statistics on overdose rates and premature deaths due to overdoses, research best practice community programs, and collaborate with the Kingfisher Project and other local efforts to leverage resources and raise awareness.
- The Public Health Director co-presented at the Non-Profit Leadership Summit at Bethel Woods on the success of the Sullivan County Breastfeeding Coalition supported by public health, WIC, CRMC, Assemblywoman Gunther, and Maternal Infant Services Network.
- Attended the Community Advisory Committee at Catskill Regional Medical Center.
- Held quarterly meetings of the Health Services Advisory Board and Professional Advisory Committee.
- Submitted the State Aid Application and required documents, the Rural Health Network budget and workplan to NYSDOH for 2015-16 to start April 1, and reviewed and prepared supporting documentation and information for the public on the County Health Rankings, released in March for 2015.
- Attended Public Safety Committee meeting to hear speakers Dr. Galarneau and Dr. Holden from CRMC on heroin and opioid addiction, who are both very involved in our Task Force at Public Health.
- Planned activities with staff for National Public Health Week, coming the first week of April.

RESOLUTION NO. INTRODUCED BY HEALTH & FAMILY SERVICES COMMITTEE TO APPLY FOR AND IF AWARDED, TO ACCEPT FUNDING FROM THE GOVERNOR'S TRAFFIC SAFETY COMMITTEE FOR THE SULLIVAN COUNTY CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY GRANT PROGRAM.

WHEREAS, hospitalizations of Sullivan County children, due to injuries sustained in motor vehicle accidents, are among the highest in the state, and

WHEREAS, Sullivan County is ranked 61 out of 62 counties for Health Outcomes in New York State (University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute. *County Health Rankings* 2014)

WHEREAS, Sullivan County Public Health Services has had a Child Passenger Safety Program since 2006 and would like to apply for continued annual funding in the amount of \$14,500 for another year, in the form of a safety grant to the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee for the purchase of car seats and supplies, and

WHEREAS, the goal of this program is to increase the proper use and installation of child safety seats by parents and caregivers in Sullivan County, and

WHEREAS, the grant would provide car seats for families whose income is at or below 200% of the federal poverty level,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Manager be and is hereby authorized to execute all documents necessary to apply for and accept funding for a 2015-16 grant, to enter into an award agreement or contract, to accept the grant funding, and to administer the funding secured, in such form as the County Attorney shall approve for the period October 1, 2015 through September 30, 2016.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the form of such contract be approved by the Sullivan County Department of Law.
